Estimated cost of living	 International students must be able to pay for their food, accommodation, transport, social life, etc. The average living expenses of a single student in Jyväskylä amounts to about €700-900 per month. Average monthly costs: rent in a student apartment 260 - 360 € food 200-250 € (eg. a lunch in a student restaurant 2,95 €) transport, leisure and other costs 150-250 €

Application form	In order to be admitted to the University of Jyväskylä, students must fill in an online application through the Mobility-Online system. The link to the online application will be send to the nominated students. The application instructions can be found at <u>https://www.jyu.fi/en/apply/student-exchange/how-to-apply</u> .
	In addition, students should attach an official transcript of records (in English) and a copy of their passport to the online application. Students also need to submit their preliminary study plan (Learning Agreement) as part of the online application.
	Course registration is done after the student's arrival to Jyväskylä and it is then possible to make changes to the preliminary study plan. Paper copies of the application or its attachments are not required.

Which courses to choose?	 Exchange students can choose courses from the curriculum of their host department and/or from the international study programmes arranged at the University of Jyväskylä. Some courses may be open to all exchange students. The openness is indicated in the course description by 'ALL' or a similar marking. Restrictions: Some courses may be targeted at students of a particular department or faculty only. Courses may have prerequisites which participants must fulfil.
Course levels	The fourth character in the course code indicates the level of study as follows: P = Basic studies, bachelor level A = Intermediate studies, bachelor level S = Advanced studies, master level.
Language of instruction	All courses offered for exchange students are given in English, apart from some language courses.

Accommodation	
How to apply for student housing	International students are accommodated in the housing units of Central Finland Student Housing Foundation (KOAS) and Soihtu Kortepohja. Accommodation is located about 2,5 - 4 kilometres from the main campus. Students should apply for accommodation as part of the application process <u>https://www.jyu.fi/en/apply/student- exchange/how-to-apply</u> . There is no need to fill in separate applications.
Application deadlines for student housing	Autumn semester: 15 May Spring semester: 1 November
Further information	The apartments are usually shared by two (sometimes more) students. Each student will have a study-bedroom for

Tenancy period	The University of Jyväskylä has reserved a quota of furnished study-bedrooms for exchange students. Those placed in the study-bedrooms of KOAS or Soihtu Kortepohja within the quota are required to sign a tenancy agreement for a fixed term. The fixed-term tenancy agreement cannot be terminated within the tenancy period.
Availability of the apartments	Student housing cannot be guaranteed to all applicants during the autumn semester. Most students coming for the spring semester will be able to get a room from KOAS or Soihtu Kortepohja.
	Student apartments are available from the first working day of the month. If students arrive earlier, they may have to stay at a hotel or hostel until the student apartment is available. More information on hotels and hostels in Jyväskylä can be found at <u>https://visitjyvaskyla.fi/en/stay-over-relax/accommodation</u> .
Monthly rent and deposit	The price for a furnished single study-bedroom with a shared kitchen and bathroom varies from $260 \in$ to $360 \in$ per month. A limited number of studios is also available at Soihtu. The price for a studio is about $400 \in$ per month. A deposit and/or rent for the first month must be paid to the accommodation office's bank account in order to confirm the housing offer.

Language Courses a	nd Language Skills Required
Language skills required	Applicants should be at least B1 but preferably B2 (or higher) level users of the English language. Students should be able to follow university lectures in English, participate in seminar discussions and understand written material in their field. In addition, most courses require writing essays and research papers. A language test certificate is not required from exchange students. NB! In order to be able to apply for English as a major subject during the exchange, a student needs to have proof of TOEFL iBT 100.

Residence Permit	
EU/EEA/EFTA citizens	Citizens of the EU/EEA/EFTA countries do not need a residence permit but they must register their right to reside in Finland if their continuous stay in Finland lasts for longer than 90 days. The registration should be done by submitting an application for registration and visiting a service point of the Finnish Immigration Service. Non-EU/EEA/EFTA citizens	Citizens of non-EU/EEA/EFTA countries who wish to stay in Finland for more than 90 days must be in possession of a residence permit when entering the country. An application for the permit should be submitted electronically at <u>https://migri.fi/en/home</u> as soon as the student has received the letter of admission. In addition to the electronic application, all applicants must visit a Finnish embassy in person to have their fingerprints collected. More information: <u>https://migri.fi/en/residence-permit-application-for-studies</u> In order to obtain a residence permit to study in Finland, international students must show that their income is secured during the academic year. They must be able to prove that they have at their disposal at least EUR 560 for a month or EUR 6720 for a year. The following conditions must also be fulfilled: • the applicant must be at least 18 years of age

	 the application must provide evidence that the applicant has been accepted as a full-time student in Finland (letter of admission) details of the comprehensive health insurance cover (with a reliable and solvent company or institution) must be attached to the application Doctoral students must apply for a residence permit for scientific research <u>https://migri.fi/en/researcher</u>. NB! Doctoral students must be able to prove that they have at their disposal at least EUR 1000 per study month. NB! Please notice that if a student wishes to open a Finnish bank account, s/he needs to be in possession of a valid residence permit.
Non-EU/EEA/EFTA citizens studying in an EU/EEA/EFTA country	Citizens of a non-EU/EEA/EFTA country who study in an EU/EEA/EFTA country as a degree student should have a valid residence permit in the country where they study as a degree student. In addition, a mobility notification should be submitted to the Finnish Immigration Service. More information: <u>https://migri.fi/en/mobility-notification-to-finland</u>

Insurance	
Non-EU/EEA/EFTA citizens	All students studying at the University of Jyväskylä are responsible for obtaining their own insurance. Insurance cover is required when applying for the residence permit.
EU/EEA/EFTA citizens	Citizens of the EU/EEA/EFTA countries should bring a European Health Insurance Card with them. The European Health Insurance Card entitles the holder to all medically necessary care during his/her stay on the same terms as the local residents. Some health centre services are by law free of charge but the health centres may charge for certain services. Additional health and travel insurance is strongly recommended to cover any unexpected expenses, such as repatriation, medical transport or damage to personal belongings.

Student tutors and free-ti	me activities
Student tutors/ Arrival Service	The International Office employs tutors (senior students) from each faculty. Their task is to acquaint new international students with the system of studies and campus life in Jyväskylä and to help them with practical questions, such as planning a timetable for studies and finding their way around the campus and the city centre.



	Tutors will contact arriving students a couple of weeks before the beginning of the semester. They will, among other things, meet the students at Jyväskylä Travel Centre (railway/bus station) when they arrive to Jyväskylä and take them to their apartments, provided that the incoming student has notified the tutor of their exact time of arrival at least one week in advance. <u>https://www.jyu.fi/en/study/new-student- handbook/plan-your-journey</u>
